The Conservation Commission approves The Sentinel's suggestion for raising the waters in certain ponds and lake to improve fish propagation.

Editor The Sentinel,

Dear Sir:

At the suggestion of some local anglers I took the liberty of sending some clippings from your newspaper with editorial comment favoring the suggestions formerly made therein in favor of the erection of a number of short and easily constructed dams at the outlet of various ponds and lakes in the vicinity of Ticonderoga, Crown Point and Moriah for the express purpose of holding up the body of water in those lakes and ponds to improve the breeding facilities of those waters as well as to act as a storage dam to keep up the flow of water from these sources and thus prevent the trout streams below from drying up during the hot weather.

The idea apparently meets with a most cordial approval from the Conservation authorities at Albany, as the abstract from the letter of the Superintendent of Fish Culture there clearly indicates, dated Dec. 27, 1933.

"Dear Mr. Flint:

Your letter of December 22nd, addressed to the Conservation Department has been handed to me for attention.

"It certainly is not necessary for me to say that I am interested in seeing the fishing improved in Essex county. We have been stocking many of the streams in this county from our field station in Crown Point and the stocking (with brook trout) has been under the supervision of our own men.

"I agree heartily with your idea of having the C. C. C. boys do some work on stream improvement. We have already improved two streams in the state with C. C. C. help. We have several projects of this kind in different counties throughout the State. Y. is the chairman of the C. W. A. instead of the C. C. C.

"I regret that I am not familiar with all the lakes and streams that are mentioned in your letter, but the improvements that you have suggested seem to be well worth consideration.

"Mr. McLaughlin, Port Henry, N. Y., is the chairman of the C. W. A. for Essex county and I would advise you to talk over with him some of the projects that you have in mind, as it is through him that money is obtained for doing this kind of work.
